Beheading of the Forerunner: As noted in the schedule, Tuesday is the Feast of the Beheading of St. John the Forerunner. It is a strict Fast Day and it is an Orthodox custom not to eat from plates or platters that day, but rather from bowls. It is a Feast Day since it marks the fulfillment of the mission of St. John to go before the Lord to announce His Coming, even to the dead. Please join us for the services of the feast on either Monday evening or Tuesday morning.

Church New Year: September 1st marks the beginning of the a New Church Year. Unlike Western Christians who begin their Church Year on the First Sunday of Advent, the Eastern Church continues to follow the custom of the Roman-Byzantine Empire. Within the first two weeks we celebrate two of the Twelve Great Feasts of the Church Year, the Nativity of the Theotokos on September 8 and the Exaltation of the Cross on September 14. This calendar reminds us of a time when civil and ecclesiastical time were kept in synchronicity. It is also a reminder to us that we no longer live in such a society. Civil time is measured apart from the time of salvation history, which is another way of saying God's time. No doubt, this creates challenges for all of us. But rather than look on this as something quaint, or a detail we can ignore, this annual event poses a serious question to each of us: whose time are we on? God's or the world's? Does the church "interrupt" our daily schedule of civil expectations or do those "interrupt" our daily schedule formed according to God's perspective? It need not be an either/or. God became human so we might become God. It is a matter of integration, of separating wheat from the chaff, and so much of our daily lives is chaff, or as a famous song of our youth put it, "dust in the wind." We have no problem recognizing this when celebrities or secular experts in psychology or "time management" or other religious traditions point this out. Why not begin this new year with a fresh perspective on our own Sacred Tradition – What if it is true? What difference should that make in my life, daily, here and now? A Blessed Church New Year to you all. May we end it wiser and holier than we begin it!
